WATER DAMAGE TO THE PALAZZO

The Palazzo, the home of the American Italian Heritage Society, has undergone extensive water damage. There were two pipes that froze and leaked into the building on Christmas Eve, December 24th, when temperatures plummeted to 25-30 degrees below zero with strong winds resulting in windchills of more than 50-60 below zero. The heat was on in the building and was checked the day before. The rare extremely cold wind chills froze the pipes and they leaked for over 24-36 hours before it was discovered. Our family got together for Christmas and as we just sat down for dinner I received a call from a neighbor near the Palazzo who said she saw water gushing out of the back doors of the building resulting in a large water and ice area covering over half of the grassy Festa grounds. I immediately left along with my sons-in-law, Bob O'Malley and Tyler Youde and arrived at the Palazzo around 5:00 pm with water and ice leaking out the front and rear doors. Inside there were two pipes above the ceiling in the south ballroom leaking and spraying water down the walls with water flooding and covering all the floors of the ballrooms and the gallery-foyer. The kitchen and the bathrooms were spared from the flood. We immediately shut off the main intake water valve to the building in the basement. There were around 1 1/2 inches of water throughout and it leaked out under the doors over the thresholds and through the door sweep seals with lots of outside ice. We assessed the damage and starting squeegeeing water on the floor out the back doors. Jim Mazzei called and came up with wet/dry vacuums. We all squeegeed and vacuumed water for about 5 hours to get some of the water out of the building. We went home and ate our Christmas dinner at 10:00 pm with wet clothes.

We called Servpro Inc that night and they came out the next morning to extract water from the floors and entry carpet and started the 10-day drying process with heavy-duty fans and dehumidifiers throughout the building. They also cleaned-up the big mess of fallen ceiling tiles and debris. The next day I met with Joe Vacanti from Vacanti & Randazzo Co. (V&R) and he contracted plumbers to repair the leaky pipes and drywallers to repair the walls and painters to paint the areas of the worst damage so that the rooms would be ready for a wedding that was scheduled that weekend. The majority of the drywall in the ballrooms got wet on the bottom few inches. We hired Steve Eichelberg of KE Flex Co. to cut holes in the walls and remove any damp insulation and place temporary finished air vents so that walls could dry out and still have the ballroom ready and presentable for a scheduled wedding and another rental. The following week (starting Monday January 16th) we had a two-week gap without any rentals (after the date was changed for one rental). At that time KE Flex Co. removed the bottom two feet of drywall and temporary air vents throughout the entire ballrooms along with all the warped baseboards including those in the gallery-foyer. Then fans and dehumidifiers allowed the inside walls to dry more. Then drywall was replaced (rocked) and skimmed and sanded on three consecutive days. Then the ballrooms (main and south) were completely repainted.

Next Arvin Demarco from Demarco Bros. Tile Co. was scheduled to come in Monday, January 23rd to refinish the damaged unsealed porous terrazzo floor in the gallery-foyer. The Demarco's took a week to sand the floor to the terrazzo, reseal with several coats and polish and buff the surface. The next week the gallery-foyer will be painted along with the cloak closet and the bridal room. Then the new pre stained baseboards will be replaced.

At that time the construction of the restoration of the water damage to the Palazzo will be completed. Then the rooms can be reset with curtains and tables and chairs by the Omaha Event Group and the Palazzo will be ready for showings and planned rentals starting on February 8th will be resumed on schedule. This was an immense amount of work in a short period of time in gaps between rentals with only one minor event rescheduled. I want to thank everyone involved in this project. I first want to thank our neighbor who called to inform us of the water gushing out of the back door on Christmas. I am very grateful to Society members Tyler Youde, Bob O'Malley and Jim Mazzei giving up 5 hours of their time on Christmas Day helping me stop the water leak and getting a lot of water out of the flooded ballrooms and foyer. I'm sincerely appreciative to Society members Gary and Mary Kay Ford for coming the day after Christmas helping with cleaning and moving tables, chairs, furniture and wet boxes, curtains, and tablecloths and also for getting any supplies needed on a short notice in this emergency situation. The Fords also communicated with the tradesmen to meet them very early in the mornings to unlock the doors to let them in to start their workdays at the Palazzo. The Society is blessed to have such great volunteers as these five members offering their time and service in such a time of need. Gary and Mary Kay Ford were also instrumental in helping me organize a plan to handle the water damage properly and timely and still be able to offer our facility to the individuals that had scheduled rentals.

I'm thankful to Servpro starting so soon the day after Christmas on removing water and cleanup and getting the drying process initiated. I'm very appreciative to Joe Vacanti and V&R and their subs doing emergency repairs to ready the facility for the scheduled wedding. Once again Joe, Chuck and Charley Vacanti have come to the rescue of the Society in a time of need. I'm also grateful to Steve Eichelberg of KE Flex and Arvin Demarco of Demarco Bros. for getting off their scheduled jobs and making our reconstruction a priority and getting completed professionally in such a timely manner. It's also necessary to be thankful to Beth Reher and her crew from the Omaha Event Group who manage the renting of all the weddings and corporate events and for removing and resetting all the curtains and tables cloths and working through their events in the middle of all the construction.

It's unfortunate that we had this inconvenient water damage but as its completion is coming to an end, I feel blessed to have all the wonderful people to work together to restore the Palazzo back to its original and now better condition.

CARNEVALE IN ITALY

Carnevale is celebrated in Italy and many places around the world during the 40 days before Easter and a final party before Ash Wednesday and Lent. The name is said to derive from the words carne vale - ‘farewell to meat’.

Carnevale was first celebrated in Venice in 1094 and has been officially sanctioned in that city since 1296. During the Middle Ages and the Renaissance Carnevale celebrations were popular throughout Europe. Today, public areas around Venice become the showcase for actors, acrobats and musicians with residents and visitors alike wearing elaborate masks and elegant costumes. One of the largest celebrations in Italy is in Viareggio, a city on the Ligurian Sea. Carnevale in Viareggio is held for the 5 weekends before Lent. The town of Ivrea, in the Piedmont region, has a unique carnival celebration with medieval roots. The carnival includes a colorful parade followed by orange-throwing battles in the center of town.

Carnevale would not be complete without food. In the south of Italy, especially around Naples, the end of Carnival on Fat Tuesday is celebrated by eating Lasagne alla Napoletana. There are a number of sweets that are typical of Carnevale and fried pastries are one of them. They are usually strips of dough that are fried and dusted with sugar or drizzled with honey. On the Amalfi Coast you might find a drop of limoncello in the pastry dough.



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Spaghetti Alla Carbonara

- 1/2 lb. thick bacon
- 4 egg yolks
- 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 bunch parsley
- 1 cup cheese
- 1 1/2 lbs. pasta
- Salt and Pepper to taste



Cut bacon into 1-inch square pieces. Cook until most of the fat has dissolved. Add a dash of salt and pepper, set aside. Place cream and butter in a large separate pan then heat gently until the butter melts. Add the egg yolks and cheese, mix together. After the pasta is cooked al dente, drain it and add it to the egg and cheese mixture and stir well. Before serving, add the bacon and stir well. Garnish with the parsley.
