CARNEVALE IN ITALY

Like France's Mardi Gras, Carnevale is the final hurrah before the restrictions of Lent begin on Ash Wednesday (February 14). During the celebrations, which can last from a day to a month, revelers are free to eat, drink, and dance without reproof. From north to south, Italy boasts dozens of unique carnival traditions, from the Battle of the Oranges in Piemonte to the spectacular folk poets in Sicilia.

A small city in northern Piemonte, Ivrea is fairly peaceful for most of the year. When Carnevale arrives, however, all bets are off. During the three days before Ash Wednesday, the townspeople reenact – with vigor – the Battle of the Oranges. The citrus-fueled fight stems from a local legend that a mugnaia, or miller's daughter, refused to spend the night with the duke and chopped off his head, sparking a civil war. On the last day – today – the mugnaia leads a parade down the city center, celebrating the rebels' triumph.

Venice carnival is among Italy's most beloved Carnevale traditions. Since it was officially established in 1296, the two-week festival's focus has been merrymaking under the freedom of le maschere, the masks. Today is no different: the city's piazzas and canals are overflowing with locals and tourists alike, donned in intricate costumes and likely heading to a grand masquerade ball.

EGGPLANT SICILIAN (Caponata)

2 med. Eggplants

2 c. sliced mushrooms, fresh or canned

6 c. celery hearts (cubed)

2 c. sliced pimento stuffed green olives

2 c. fresh onion (cubed)

1 lg. garlic clove, cut in half

1 c. olive oil

2 qt. boiling water

3 lg. fresh tomatoes

salt & pepper to taste

Cut eggplant into 1-inch slices and remove skin. Cut slices into 4 to 6 pieced depending on size of slice. Cooking on moderate het, sauté eggplant in 1/2 cup olive oil half cooked, then add cubed tomato. In separate pan using the remaining oil, cook until half done the celery, onions, mushrooms, green olives and garlic. Combine with the eggplant and tomato. Continue cooking for an additional 5 minutes on low heat to incorporate flavors. Add salt and pepper to taste; cool. Cover and store in refrigerator for 24 hours.

Tribute to John Stella

The AIHS Recognition Award was presented to John Stella for the renaming of Brown Baseball Park to "John Stella Field" at the general membership meeting on March 9, 2009. John was presented with a plaque at this tribute. For the first time in Omaha's history a baseball field has been named in honor of a person of Italian descent. This should make all of us Omaha Italians proud! His story:

John Stella, whose family emigrated from Bari Italy has been a member of the AIHS for over 25 years. His home was across the street from the Christ Child Center West (west Omaha at that time). He played sandlot baseball at Columbus Park, excelled in the sport for South High School and received a scholarship to play baseball for Omaha University. After college, in 1957, he was drafted by the San Francisco Giants. To make the roster, he had to beat our future hall of famer's Willy Mays and Matty Alou. He played mine league baseball for the Giants for three years. Upon returning to Omaha, John found employment at the Omaha Post Office where he worked for over 30 years before retiring in 1992.

When John returned to Omaha he gave back to the community and gave back to his Italian neighborhood, i.e., Little Italy on 22nd and Poppleton. In 1961, he began coaching at CYO Senior (high school) League Baseball team consisting of mostly Italian kids from St. Ann's neighborhood. He won the CYO championship his first year as a coach. He coached many young men from St. Ann's for years and was proud to make a difference in their lives personally. Many of those players today still talk about their coach, baseball experiences, and life lessons learned.

In 1982 as a one year commitment, John began coaching South High School Legion Baseball. One year turned into 27 more years of dedication and service to the your of his neighborhood and the students of South High School. To this day, John is still an assistant coach to South High's baseball team and head coach of South High's Legion summer team. Recently, John received a National Award for 500 wins as a high school coach. Last year he was inducted into the South High School Alumni Hall of Fame.

Now coaching baseball for nearly fifty years John has been honored as the first Italian who has had a baseball field named after him. Congratulations John, we are all very proud of you!
